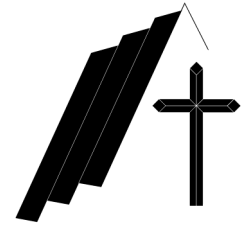

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

In But Not Of; Apart for the Sake Of

This is a recurring pattern for God's people. As I am writing, it is the Fourth Sunday in Lent we see where our Lord Jesus feeding the Five Thousand. His miracle despite the disciples' perplexity is what typically stands out at this great event. But it begins where He "went away" with them, still in the world to be sure, before the large crowd followed (Jn. 6:1-2). Why go away? So they can be distinct and attend to holy and saving purposes. Blending in with "the world," we easily can become part of it, but this way they and Jesus can go in from without and save it. By "world" John means the ignorant, unbelieving, rebelling, or rejecting "world" of people, apart from God in Christ.

The other gospels are even more explicit about Jesus' separating Himself, sometimes to be with His Father in prayer, before others go out to gather to Him, before eventually then going back into "the world." Indeed, this is the way it was in the Old Testament. Abraham, for example, is called *away* (Gen. 12) before getting the promise that thru him all nations would be blessed. In a way, it is the story of OT Israel itself – set apart ...so that thru them the Messiah and Savior for all might come.

You are probably reading this in the mid-to-late Easter season, where the Sunday Gospels are sections of John 14-16. Here, the Lord is *in* the upper room with His disciples just before His death, telling them how it will be for them *in* the world, preparing them for their lives and ministry when they go *out*. John 17 is especially where we most directly hear the words, "*In... but not of the world.*" In His crucifixion and burial He was still *in* the world, though *out* of the city. But like the crowds at the feeding of the five-thousand, the women would go out to gather to Him. Later, they would go back *in* to report the news of the Resurrection. At Pentecost the Lord then sent the Holy Spirit to His gathered-apart disciples to bring "all things to [their] remembrance," empowering and sending them *into* the world to preach the Gospel, calling all to its true Lord.

This is the pattern for us as Christians today. Weekly (or more!) we gather to our Lord where He forgives, renews, and teaches us, before we go back out to our stations in the world... so that as Christians we can be and act "for the life of the world," bringing it all to Jesus through faith. The word "church" comes from the Greek, "*ecclesia.*" *Ec* (think: "exit")-*cleisia*. It more literally means "assembly" or "called-out ones," and implies some exclusivity. That sounds rather counter-cultural where currently "inclusivity" is all the rage, doesn't it?

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But what happens when any person, group, or organization can't separate itself? It ends up being just like the rest of the world around it - nothing special, garbage-in-garbage-out, dying. Here in the Church, we assemble to the world's One-and-only, very unique Lord, who alone can forgive sin and so bestow a new and different and very real life, so that we can bring life to the world.

Indeed, even daily you probably take certain times of the way to "take a break," "step back and gain perspective," in your vocation, whether in the form of a post-lunch walk or water break. Every morning I set apart time for daily devotions (including Matins), and other certain times, where I begin anew, and often get my most refreshing insights and learning. I hope and pray you do too, for that matter. If not, I'd be happy to offer some help and suggestions.

In the coming weeks, I'm looking forward to some conferences, continuing ed., and vacation time. Why? So, I can hopefully gather to where the Lord teaches and refreshes, so I come back ready to serve. You might be planning for likewise. As you do, keep in mind the purpose is not merely to "get out of the world." You'll never be able to do that, after all. But you can step apart. It's for the sake of it, for the life of it, and indeed your own life, which can only come as the Lord refreshes you in His word and Sacrament.

We are all well-aware of how the world around us is going crazy. Seemingly everywhere there are fingers pointing only to have fingers pointing back. It is inclusively exclusive and exclusively inclusive. Everyone seeks to escape, so that no one is really escaping. Let's not join it. With our in-but-not-of-the-world Lord Jesus, as a congregation and members individually, in all our endeavors we can be the rare salt and light (Mt. 5) the world needs for its life in these gray and latter days.

Why? A Layman's Guide to the Liturgy

Why are the candles lit from top to bottom?

When the candles are lit for the Mass, the ones closest to the center are lit first, moving outward from there. This is to signify that the source of our life and salvation comes from the altar. The altar not only signifies the sacrifice of Christ for our sins, but is also the place from which the Holy Sacrament is given. Christ, the light of the world, is truly given to us, in the Holy Sacrament, from the altar. Therefore the light of the world truly shines forth from the altar. The lighting of candles outward from the altar (the topmost candle being also the innermost candle, and so forth) signifies the truth. Light goes forth from the altar. At the close of the service, the candles are extinguished in reverse order, as a further signification of this: the light returns to the altar whence it came, that we might be reminded that it will come forth from there again and again, to the end of the world. ✠

Why is the cross carried in procession?

When the processional crucifix is carried through the nave to its place in the sanctuary, it leads the way: for the choir, for the attendants, for the clergy, for the celebrant, and indeed, for all the people. Although the people do not actually process (except on Palm Sunday and at the Great Vigil of Easter), they with heart and mind join the procession, being led by the cross. This is to express with our actions our agreement with the words of the apostle Paul, "I determined not to know anything among you except Jesus Christ and Him crucified."

Therefore the proper response of faith to entrance of the cross is to turn sideways to face it as it passes one's pew on its entrance, and to turn toward the altar as the procession passes. It is also proper to bow the head and make the sign of the cross at the moment when the cross passes, as a gesture of humility toward the Crucified One. At the close of the Mass, when the cross processes out, it is also fitting to reverence. (It is not necessary to continue facing the cross as it continues all the way to the back of the church, however, as this would involve the unseemly turning of one's back on the Body and Blood of Christ.)

Reverence toward the crucifix is a way of acknowledging Christ's deep humility, saying in effect, if He would so humble Himself, should not I also humble myself? ✠

Why are torches sometimes carried in procession?

The use of torches (i.e. candles on poles) contributes to the beauty and ceremony of a procession. Two torches are carried side by side in procession behind the processional crucifix. As lights on poles, they call to mind the words of Christ concerning light. In one place He says, "I am the light of the world," and in another, to His disciples, "You are the light of the world." A city that is set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do they light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a lampstand, and it gives light to all who are in the house. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven." In these words, Christ teaches us that the shining of Christian light is in truth the shining of Christ Himself. When the Christian Church believes, teaches, and confesses the Gospel, the light which is Christ Himself shines. Since in the Mass Christ is preached and confessed, therefore it is fitting that candles be employed; and so too, to add to the celebration, candles on poles, or torches. ✠

From the Board of Christian Mercy:

Swaddling Clothes

On April 13 our Swaddling Clothes volunteers attended Matins followed by an opening prayer for our center led by Pastor Meissner. This is something we will continue to do each month as it is essential to have a devotion/prayer before we open our doors and share Christ with our young families. It feeds our faith and is part of our sanctified lives. *“For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them.”* Ephesians 2:10

Swaddling Clothes Center continues to be open the 2nd Saturday of every month from 10:00 am – 1:00 pm. We received a grant of \$1,200 from the Roy D. and Ingaborg G. Randolph Memorial Endowment Fund for the 2023 calendar year. The funds were used to purchase eight movable (they have wheels) shelving units to store our donated items.

Martin Luther Academy gifted us \$1,225 from one quarter of their offerings. We just purchased \$800 worth of baby items such as play mats and booster seats and have also used some of those funds for various items like diapers, baby wipes, strollers, hangers, etc.

We have also received many monetary and homemade gifts from congregational members and various others. We are using these gifts to keep the center going with needed supplies such as diapers, baby food, lotion, formula, baby wipes, pacifiers, books, curtains to close off our areas, coded door locks, label maker, pager system, Arch books, vacuum cleaner, shampoo, lotion, baby wash, toys, dolls, spoons, totes to store our clothing etc.

In March we took part in the Rhea Lana program where we received much needed clothing, toys, etc.

We have applied for a \$1,000 matching grant through the Missouri Synod called the Million Dollar Match. We should hear something in May to let us know if we get it or not. If we do, we have to raise \$1,000 that they will match.

Swaddling Clothes is also looking at having a float in the Gladstone (Glad Fest) parade the first week in October to show our presence in the community and our support of Life. If you have an idea for a float or would like to walk in the parade with us just let us know. Right now we have a small airplane to pull but if you have something better we have open ears!

In April, Swaddling clothes provided the needs of 46 families. We handed out 2,400 diapers, 62 packages of baby wipes and 26 large items that included strollers and high chairs besides all the other necessities and toys families need. Helping our Holy Cross volunteers were members from Christ Lutheran Church of Platte Woods Outreach Team along with the Director of LCMS Mission Advancement. She took pictures and video as part of the Shine servant event that Christ Lutheran Church was participating in. They are planning on helping us again in May. We also have a very dedicated lady from our community that volunteers each month interpreting Spanish for our Spanish speaking families. Thank you Lord for every volunteer!

Right now are greatest needs are: Diapers (sizes NB – 6 and pull-ups), baby wipes and small toys for ages NB – 2T. The toys do not need to be new, just clean and in working condition. We also need male volunteers to help each month with heavy lifting, carrying items to cars, gatekeeping, and safety.
